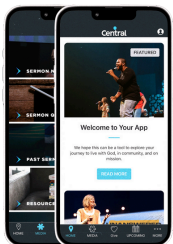
Big Idea:

The Gospel was commanded by Jesus, carried by the early church, and continues through us; it is not a private arrangement but a public announcement of the Kingdom of God.

1. How should thinking of the Gospel as a public announcement, rather than a private belief, change the way we live?
2. What are some ways you've seen the Gospel "drift" into personal preference, sentimentality, or being lost in the noise of everyday life?
3. Acts 28:30-31 describes Paul's situation at the end of Acts. How should these verses shape our view of what sharing the Gospel involves?
4. When have you experienced the temptation to "tweak" the message of the Gospel to make it trendier, safer, or more acceptable?
5. Reflecting on Colossians 4:5-6, what does it look like for your conversations to be "full of grace, seasoned with salt" in your everyday life?
6. How does viewing the Gospel as the "good news of the Kingdom" rather than just a personal salvation story reshape how you think about evangelism?
7. What's one ordinary way you can be part of carrying the Gospel forward this week—without needing a microphone or a platform?
8. Where in your life right now do you feel invited to "go and tell"—and what is holding you back from doing it boldly?



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
