BOTTOM LINE

To see Christmas through Joseph's eyes is to respond to wrong as servants of the Lord. We don't seek justice without showing compassion.

KEY VERSES

Matthew 1:18-25 Deut. 22:23-24 Isaiah 42:1-3 Proverbs 15:1 Romans 2:1-4 Ephesians 4:26

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. What was your major takeaway from the message this morning?
- 2. What thoughts and emotions spring to mind when you read Deuteronomy 22:23-24 as the context for Joseph's actions in Matthew 1:19?
- 3. Joseph was a man of justice 'AND YET'. How does Isaiah 42:1-3 develop your understanding of the kind of justice servants of the Lord pursue? What implications does this have for you today?
- 4. When you are wronged how easy is it for you to be compassionately just?
- 5. The word 'considered' implies a sense of anger, wrath and rage in Joseph's ponderings (Matthew 1:20). How did this thought challenge the way you viewed the character of Joseph?
- 6. How does your anger get recycled as grace?
- 7. In His ministry, Jesus told parables about fathers and masters, both of whom had the right to be angry, showing compassion and grace.
 - How important was the thought of God's grace when you came to faith in Christ?
 - How significant is it that Jesus saw this trait modelled in his step-father?
 - How significant could this be for our children if we allow our anger to be reprocessed as grace?
