Prayer can be practiced as wrongly as sacrifice. We aren't asked to choose prayer over sacrifice but put both into action in the right way. It's a both/and not an either/or.

Sacrifice

The act of giving up something great for the sake of something considered greater. The willingness to give up something valued, for the sake of something more valuable.

Prayer

An act of communion with God or, as Ralph Martin puts it, "Prayer is, at root, simply paying attention to God" [The Fulfilment of All Desire, p.121].

Prayer and No Sacrifice

No Sacrifice and No Prayer

These people come near to me with their mouth and honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me. Their worship of me is based on merely human rules they have been taught.

Isaiah 29:13

Sacrifice but No Prayer

To do what is right and just is more acceptable to the Lord than sacrifice.

Proverbs 21:3

The craving of a sluggard will be the death of him, because his hands refuse to work. All day long he craves for more, but the righteous give without sparing. The sacrifice of the wicked is detestable—how much more so when brought with evil intent!

Proverbs 21:25-27

"So when you give to the needy, do not announce it with trumpets, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and on the streets, to be honored by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward in full."

Matthew 6:2

With what shall I come before the Lord and bow down before the exalted God? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousand rivers of olive oil? Shall I offer my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?
